Newsletter: Upcoming ECRIME events: the ARES EU Project Symposium in August 31, 2016

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On the 31st of August, ECRIME will run a workshop as part of the ARES EU Project Symposium. The symposium is being hosted as a one-day event within the wider ARES 2016 11th International Conference on Availability and Security, held at the Salzburg University of Applied Sciences, Austria.

Here the ECRIME consortium will be teaming up with members of the ECRIME Stakeholder Forum, drawn from the banking sector and the UK Digital Cabinet Office to present insights on: the challenges of measuring cybercrime; a view on the frontline on pursuing, apprehending and prosecuting cyber criminals; discussing cyber-criminal journeys; identified opportunities for effect countermeasures; and lessons learned on the fight against fraud and the protection of digital identities.
