The E-CRIME project is ending soon and we are organizing a final conference in London on **Friday 24th March 2017** to disseminate the tools, policy recommendations, training guides and frameworks, developed during the project to interested stakeholders. Indeed, in organising this event we have endeavored to shape each session such that they all focus on providing our audience with concrete ‘take-aways’ that they can import into their own organisations.

This one-day event will be held in **The National Gallery** (Conference Room 1), **Trafalgar Square, London WC2N 5DN**.

In addition to this E-CRIME event, a complementary research project, BYTE is also organising a conference in London on the 9th February 2017 at the Amba Hotel, Marble Arch, Central London. BYTE will be hosting their project’s final conference on *Capturing the benefits of big data and addressing legal, ethical and social challenges*. The conference will include policy-makers, large industry, academics, civil society organisations, SMEs and legal experts, and it will focus on three priority areas for big data practice in Europe: (1) smart cities; (2) healthcare, and (3) environmental data.

The event will showcase BYTE findings and feature presentations by experts in genomics, urban transportation, geo-spatial data, open data and linked data.
